Recently I visited with a pastor who confided that when he planted his church he chose not to talk

about finances in the pulpit. His reasoning was that unchurched people do not want to hear about finances. After a year, the church plant was in crisis financially. Looking back he knew he should have taught financial giving from the beginning.



In their book Ten Most

Common Mistakes Made by New Church Starts, Bill Easum and Jim Griffith write: "Too many planters have bought into the *myth* that unchurched people don't attend church 'because they're always talking money.' In all our interviews we've never heard any unchurched person say they failed to attend or return due to the issue of money. The complaint 'the church is always talking about money' owes its origins to a

vocal group of 'church people' who many years ago didn't agree with some financial decision in their church and yanked their pledge, putting the church in financial jeopardy. Only then did they become tired of hearing the leadership plead for money."

Easum suggests that you make up a weekly disclaimer about finances and share it verbatim. "Making a disclaimer during the time of collection can actually be a 'teaching moment' to all attending." He states, "Here is what you should say."
